

#### The First World War and the Armistice

The First World War was a conflict on a scale the world had never seen before. It lasted over four years and it is estimated that over 18 million people died, soldiers and civilians, while over 23 million were wounded.

In 1918, when it became clear that they could not win the war, the Germans had to agree to the demands of the Allied leaders of Britain, France and the USA. The war ended with the signing of the Armistice, or peace agreement, in a railway carriage in the French forest of Compiègne. At 11am on 11 November 1918—the eleventh hour of the eleventh month—the guns finally fell silent.

The **Armistice** was signed early in the morning of 11 November. Most soldiers were told quickly by their officers, who had heard via radio, telephone and from runners, that hundreds of thousands of men on both sides would lay down their arms at the same time later that morning. But some were harder to reach, even using runners. As a result, there were several skirmishes and confused firing of shells and bullets even after 11am, leading, sadly, to the deaths of even more young men.

For many, the war would never be over. The horrific things that they had seen would live on in their minds for ever. A whole generation of young men had been lost and their families left to grieve.

In most towns and villages in the UK, there are memorials to those who died. Dur-



ing my research, I have also visited the graveyards in France and Belgium. As you travel across what is now beautiful countryside, it seems there are endless cemeteries, each with hundreds or thousands of bodies laid to rest. The cemeteries are confusing places. On the one hand, you feel horrified by the number of perfectly tended graves; on the other, you are

inspired by how they are remembered in this way over a century later.

The First World War was supposed to be the war to end all wars, but only twentyone years later, after the rise of Hitler in Germany, the world would find itself caught up in another horrific conflict.

### **Alzheimer's Disease**



Dementia is the name for a set of symptoms that includes memory loss and difficulties with thinking, problem-solving or language. Dementia develops when the brain is damaged by diseases, including Alzheimer's disease. Alzheimer's disease is a physical disease that affects the brain. It is named after Alois Alzheimer, the doctor who first described it.

The symptoms of Alzheimer's disease are generally mild to start with, but as more brain cells are damaged over time the symptoms get worse and start to interfere with a person's day-to-day life. There are some common symptoms of Alzheimer's disease, but no one's experience will be exactly the same as anyone else's.

For most people, the first signs of Alzheimer's are problems with their memory – in particular, difficulties recalling recent events and learning new information. However, the person's memory for events that happened a long time ago is not usually affected in the early stages.

As well as memory difficulties, people with Alzheimer's are also likely to have – or go on to develop – other problems. These include problems with thinking, reasoning, language or perception such as:

- speech they may repeat themselves or struggle to follow a conversation
- seeing things in three dimensions and judging distances (visuospatial skills) – going up or down stairs or parking the car might become much harder
- concentrating, planning or organising they may struggle with making decisions, solving problems or carrying out a sequence of tasks (such as cooking a meal)
- orientation they may become confused or lose track of the day or date.

A person in the earlier stages of Alzheimer's will often have changes in their mood. They may become anxious, depressed or more easily annoyed. These changes can be challenging for both the person with dementia and those close to them to live with.

More than 520,000 people in the UK have dementia caused by Alzheimer's disease and this figure is set to rise.



# **Geographical terms**

#### Landslide

A **landslide** or **landslip** occurs when large blocks of rock become detached and slide downhill.



## Escarpment

An **escarpment** is an area of the Earth where elevation changes suddenly. Escarpment usually refers to the bottom of a cliff or a steep slope. (Scarp refers to the cliff itself.)

Escarpments separate two level land surfaces. An escarpment also usually indicates two different types of land, such as the area on a rocky beach where tall cliffs become rocky sand.



## Scree

**Scree** is a collection of broken rock fragments at the base of crags, mountain cliffs, volcanoes or valley shoulders that has accumulated through periodic rockfall from adjacent cliff faces.



## Glacier

**Glaciers** are made up of fallen snow that, over many years, compresses into large, thickened ice masses. Glaciers form when snow remains in one location long enough to transform into ice. What makes glaciers unique is their ability to flow. Due to sheer mass, glaciers flow like very slow rivers.



Volunteer mountain rescue team members are on call, 24 hours a day, 365 days a year to recover climbers from precipitous crags, reunite lost walkers with their pals and ensure injured and sick casualties are safely delivered into vital hospital care.

But they also regularly help search for missing children and vulnerable adults, on and off the hills, whilst administering sympathetic support to their families. They search river banks and swift water, and wade chest-deep through flooded urban streets aiding swimmers, kayakers and devastated homeowners.

And, between them, they rescue a frankly stunning number of dogs, cows, sheep and any number of other animals, from all manner of inaccessible places.

All this whilst continuing to practise and hone their first aid skills, technical ropework, water rescue and search management, and maintaining their bases, equipment and vehicles – not to mention taking time to maintain their own fitness.
